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Fantastic Exam Results at A-Level and GCSE

In August 2018 Bishop Luffa Sixth Formers had much to celebrate when they got their impressive A-Level results. Close to a third of all exams taken by the group of 144 students gained top grades A*-A, and across the cohort students achieved an average of a B grade overall. Jamie Saunders, Head of Sixth Form, said, "This is the first year that the new A-Level curriculum has been examined for the majority of subjects. Coursework has largely disappeared, the new exams are tougher and more content-heavy than before, and the number and length of exams has increased. As a result, the pressure has never been greater. Our students have therefore done incredibly well to persevere and exhibit the strength of character, grit and resilience to achieve outstanding results. They have worked extremely hard to meet their potential and now embark on a range of exciting courses at some very competitive universities."

Outstanding GCSE results also greeted excited pupils in August 2018, with pupils excelling themselves this year. The new specifications were tougher than before: coursework was out and terminal exams were in; the rote-learning of much more knowledge is the new style, which is tested in more and longer exams. These had been stressful times for our young people. Overall, 36% of all exams gained the top range of points 9-7, equivalent to the old A*-A grades, and 88% of all entries gained grades 9-4 (or A*-C). There were over 150 entries at the top grade 9. We were delighted with these fantastic results .











A warm Bishop Luffa welcome to Year 7

At the beginning of September we welcomed our new Year 7 pupils to Bishop Luffa School, at the same time as welcoming back all our other pupils. They started their day with breakfast, before spending the morning getting to know each other through a range of activities. *Positively MAD* gave a great session showing Year 7 creative approaches to learning. The day concluded with Spaghetti Towers, a traditional, healthy inter-house competition, the winners being Otter House. Mr Topley, Assistant Headteacher, Head of Key Stage 3 talked to the pupils about how to get the BEST out of their time at Bishop Luffa, linking in to our motto 'Always our BEST because everyone matters.'

On Friday 14 December, after bidding for the show back in 2013, Bishop Luffa played host to BBC Radio 4's Any Questions? — a topical discussion panel in which an array of personalities from the worlds of politics, media and elsewhere are posed questions by the audience. Hosted by the preeminent Jonathan Dimbleby, panellists included Hilary Benn MP (Labour), former shadow Foreign Secretary, known for his Syria speech, Peter Bone MP (Conservative), a staunch Brexiteer who tried to remove the PM, as well as Caroline Nokes MP (Conservative), Minister of State for Immigration at the Home Office and Sir Vince Cable MP (Liberal Democrat), current leader of the Liberal Democrats.

Some students, staff and parents were fortunate enough to meet with Mr Dimbleby and the MPs after the event, speaking freely on political issues of all kinds, and at one point, football. All of the panellists and Mr Dimbleby himself were particularly engaged with the students, curious to trade perspectives and experiences, and shared the details of what it's really like in Westminster.

We had a fantastic team of volunteers from local churches who came to support this event.







The students were interested to know what issues should be being addressed and Mrs Keegan said that two burning issues were housing and mental health. Head Teacher Austen Hindman

said, "We have been very lucky at Bishop Luffa School to have had two recent opportunities for our students to talk directly with politicians who are involved in the Brexit debate.

"The first was 'Any Questions?', which was broadcast live from our school before Christmas, and now we have had our local MP come into lessons and give a first-hand account of events in Parliament. By being so open and honest, Mrs Keegan has helped to engage our students in the political process. We are very grateful that she gave up her time to come and visit the school."

Year 10 Work Experience Week

In Year 10 we offer our pupils the opportunity to take part in the Work Experience Scheme. A work experience placement gives our pupils the chance to see what a job is like first hand, to broaden their horizons, develop confidence and learn new valuable life skills.

A placement can help pupils discover the career of their dreams, and identify talents they didn't know they had. Sometimes it can also help them to discover that their dream job isn't quite so 'dreamy' after all. Our Year 10 completed a very successful week in a variety of organisations and roles; Law firms, Architects, Tea rooms, Veterinary Practices, Police Force, Retail, Garages, Aviation, Publishers, Stables, the West End - the list of placements gets more extensive and exciting each year.

Feedback from pupils has been incredibly positive, with many keen to tell us in great detail what their placement entailed. Most have been reassured that their perfect job has been what they expected and more, and that their desire to pursue it as a career has been reinforced. Those who undertook a placement that was not

linked to their career aspirations have still returned to school with more confidence, stronger social skills and an awareness of who they are as a person.

We have also received reports from employers who couldn't wait to tell us how excellent our pupils were, how hard they worked whilst on placement, and what a pleasure it had been to work alongside them. Many of the reports received have said how our pupils are a credit to our school, with the words 'polite, helpful, engaged, enthusiastic, positive, professional' littering the references. 






STEMFest 2019

Launch of Business2Schools Charity

The *Business2Schools* charity was launched at a special event held at Bishop Luffa School. The purpose of the charity is to ensure that businesses send all of their old furniture and IT equipment to schools, so that nothing ends up in landfill. The event was attended by representatives from the businesses who are supporting the project and local Head Teachers and Business Managers.

The charity has been set up by Lindsey Parslow, who has children at Bishop Luffa. Lindsey works in London and was horrified by the amount of high quality furniture and IT equipment that was being sent to landfill sites instead of being recycled. Lindsey now has a register of companies that have pledged to send their unwanted equipment to schools. Her charity provides the connections to the schools themselves and helps to organise delivery.

Bishop Luffa School has been the pilot school for the project. We have been receiving a steady supply of furniture and IT equipment for the last year. This has allowed us to replace desks and chairs across the school with items that cost thousands of pounds new. One frustration for all of us, staff and students alike, is how slow school computers can be. Thanks to *Business2Schools*, we will be able to replace every computer in the building with a higher specification alternative. The project has also provided opportunities for our students to gain work experience. A team of Sixth Formers have helped to set up the website, manage the inventory and even designed the *Business2Schools* logo. When a company donates its equipment to a school, it begins a relationship that brings many other benefits. This scheme will have a positive impact on the environment and on our students.










Fruition 2019

Sixth Formers campaign for Votes at 16



A Fond Farewell to Year 13


