

Visit from a Great Britain Beauty Queen

Anya spoke to students about the mental health issues including her issues with her body image and self-confidence and her struggle with mental health throughout her teenage years. She also spoke about the grief caused by the recent loss of her dad to Motor Neurone Disease (NMD) which has spurred her on to live life to its fullness. This includes recently becoming involved in the pageant world of run ways and beauty queens. Through her journey in the pageant world, she had had the opportunity to do lots of charity work including raising awareness and funds for NMD as well as supporting local charities.

Year 9 reflect on the First World War

Year 9 students have been able to enhance their studies of WWI this half term with a source box of original and replica WWI artefacts from the Novium Museum used in all lessons. Some were also able to learn through film with a cinema trip. One of the students on the trip writes as follows:

A small group of us had the opportunity to visit the New Park Cinema after school at the beginning of December with Mrs Fowles and Mrs Shuttleworth to see The Choral. Set during WWI in a Yorkshire village, the film was about a choir learning to sing and having to adapt as more and more of the members of the choir left to fight in the war. The new choir master had lived in Germany and initially the people in the Yorkshire village didn't like him because they assumed he was a German sympathiser.



The film reinforced what we have been learning about with WWI and how the war affected soldiers' emotionally and physically as well as their families and friends back at home. It showed in a really clever and poignant way the sorts of injuries soldiers had and it helped me to understand the broader impact of war. I really enjoyed the film and how we were able to learn more about the war and what life was like on the Home Front whilst also being entertained. "I loved it, it was super fun and helped me with improving my confidence in public speaking skills by teaching ways to prevent yourself using fuller words." – Alasdair Sturrock


"Improved my confidence when speaking, even in a short amount of time." – Matthew Hewett


Year 10 Art Students inspired in London

In what has become an annual moment of solemn commemoration, the whole School came together on the 11th November for a formal service of remembrance, this time on the Humanities Playground. As well as readings by Mr Hindman and our School Captains, Scarlette Guilfoyle and Rupert Reddington,



there were also prayers from Father Phill, and the Kohima Epitaph from Mr Bonney (both ex-forces). We observed the two minutes silence at 11am, which was marked by the Last Post and Reveille, superbly played by Year 12 student Izzy Deans. A guard of honour made up of students who serve in uniformed organisations then accompanied the wreath laying party, as wreaths were laid by Mr Bonney and School Captains.

Mr Hindman closed the service by blowing a whistle used in the trenches of the First World War. Behaviour was excellent, as Bishop Luffa continued to work hard to ensure that the suffering of war, and the sacrifices made for our freedoms, are not forgotten.

Year 8 delve into the past!

Over four days, all of Year 8 were able to visit the Mary Rose Museum in Portsmouth as part of their History studies. Year 8 investigate the Tudors, so a visit to see the remains of Henry VIII's flagship, especially when it is on our doorstep, is too good an opportunity to miss. As well as seeing the ship itself, students were able to see some of the many artefacts lifted from the Solent as part of the recovery process. They were fascinated, for example, by some of the gory surgical equipment, and the remains of the ship's dog. This gave them an insight into life onboard a Tudor warship, and therefore the life of some ordinary people, whom history has often tended to overlook. They also found out about why the ship sank, and how it was raised (which myself and some of the older teachers were able to recall from the early 1980s!), which included a '4d' film with associated glasses!

As well as a tour of the museum, students also undertook a workshop, including on the horrors of Tudor medicine (which also relates well to part of our current GCSE course). The students were well behaved, and days like this



emphasise that there are many different ways that we can learn about the past, including the history of our local area.

My thanks must go to the numerous staff who accompanied the visit, and hence made it possible, and to students for their level of interest and enthusiasm.

Our team put up a very strong opposition argument to the motion “This house would ban short-haul domestic flights where transport alternatives exist” and received brilliant feedback from the judges.

The team were excited to find out that they had done enough to progress to the second round which should be held in January. We will receive a new motion to debate for or against and we will have a new trio to take part with the support of the rest of the team. We have put ourselves forward to host which would be a fantastic opportunity for the whole school to celebrate our dedicated debate team.


Finally thank you to the staff and students who help look after the hens as well as the large team of volunteer families who help at weekends and holidays.

Their next challenge will be the British Championships in February.

Oscar Stephen (8Story) returned from the 74th Trofeo Ciutat de Palma Optimist Regatta sailing competition where he came 273rd out 346 sailors. The competition was fierce with current and previous World, European/Continental and National Champions all fighting it out from countries as far as Brazil, Peru, Singapore, Uruguay, India, USA and Norway to name a few.
