raised enough money to buy one hundred sets of washable sanitary products. She and her friends met with teenage girls in the village and gave them the kits and showed them how to use them. Teenage girl to teenage girl, they made equality possible and changed a hundred lives.

This month was the 60th anniversary of the Queen Mother opening Bishop Luffa's brand new building. Miss

Marples, the original Deputy Head, said that the school was intended to be 'a Christian environment where our duty to God and others was paramount' and that this made the school 'a studious caring community from the beginning'. I think that Holly's actions show that this sentiment is still alive at Bishop Luffa School. I also think that it is on display through-out our newsletter, as you get a glimpse into the lives of some amazing young people. I hope you enjoy reading about them!

Bishop Luffa Intermediate Girls Shine at ESAA Track & Field Cup A Final

n 19th June Bishop Luffa School's Intermediate Girls Athletics Team competed in the ESAA Track and Field Cup A Final at Medway Park. Against strong competition from across the South East, the girls delivered a spirited and impressive performance to place 7th overall with 389 points, this was a 20-point improvement from their country round qualifier and a remarkable achievement at this elite level.

Held under bright summer skies and warm temperatures, the girls rose to the occasion with some outstanding individual performances and a powerful team effort across all events. The event brought together top-performing schools from across the country, and our girls did not disappoint.



The team saw several individual successes, with Elodie Hill (10King) delivering the highest-scoring event of the day for Bishop Luffa with an outstanding 1500m time of 4:53.0, earning 30 points ranking 3rd on the day with Isabella Lendrum (9Burrows) closely behind in 3rd with a time of 4:56.0 scoring 29 points. In the hammer throw, Anna Wyatt (9Otter) threw an excellent 30.80m to score 23 points, while Kate Horgan (10King) impressed in the 100m with a time of 13.7, adding 19 points to the tally.

However, athlete of the day for Bishop Luffa was

Elodie Hill as she backed up her outstanding 1500m time with 9.12m in the triple jump amassing a huge 46 points for the team! Every athlete played a crucial role in the team's success, both on the track and in the field, and the camaraderie and support among the team members was a credit to the school.

This opportunity would not have been possible without the generous support of our sponsors. We are incredibly grateful to Chelsea Flower Show gold medallists *The Little Botanical* and *Barfoot Foods* for sponsoring the team and helping to make this fantastic experience a reality for our students supporting travel and kit costs. The workshop focused on Chichester's rich history of pirates and smugglers and was both educational and entertaining, with an array of displays that brought the



past to life. One of the highlights was a short video that gave a dramatic overview of how a terrifying band of local south coast smugglers operated along our coastline. The infamous Hawkhurst Gang have certainly left their mark: from a gibbet in Selsey, to the Smuggler's Stone on the Broyle Road, both serving as a reminder of the harsh punishments for smugglers.

We also took part in several interactive group tasks, including looking at authentic clothing worn by smugglers, complete with secret pockets in coats and false heels in shoes. The museum also featured a collection of silks, lace, a leather cat-o'-nine-tails and other artefacts — the most unusual being a beautiful compressed and embossed block of tea; at the time, the most efficient way to transport loose tea from China. The trip was a fascinating insight into the daring and dangerous lives of pirates and smugglers, and it made our local history feel vivid and exciting. They got stuck into some of the clever thinking the original codebreakers used, even applying binary and XOR logic – key parts of their GCSE course – to understand how the fiendish code was cracked.



After a quick stop for lunch, students explored the historic site, soaking up the atmosphere in the famous codebreaking huts. A real highlight was the "Age of AI" exhibition, which brilliantly connects the pioneering work of the past to the technology that's shaping our future.



The trip ended at the National Museum of Computing. It was amazing to see the world's largest collection of working historic computers. Seeing the rebuilt Colossus – the world's first electronic computer – and a functional Bombe machine in action really brought the story to life. It was a great way to see how computing has evolved from giant, secret machines into the technology we use every day.

Chicken Club 2024/25

In our second year of having our wonderful hens at school, they and Chicken Club are thriving. Our flock of 20 chickens has helped more than 35 different students have a calmer start to the school day with our morning intervention session. At least 70 different students have come to Chicken Club at lunchtimes throughout the year and 12 students have completed their DofE Volunteering section with us. All students involved have helped take care of the hens and the chickens have provided a safe space for students to relax and enjoy their therapeutic influence. We have also planted hedging and produced lots of beautiful compost. Special thanks go to Ned McCormac (10Ridgeway) and Jack Byrne (80tter) who have been committed members whatever the weather.



We held the school's first ever Chicken Week in March and that, along with egg sales and three generous donations have helped us raise a total of £3445.28 this school year. Along with money from last year, the run-down brick outbuilding has been converted into a usable storage space for our equipment. We also have the funds to get water to the building and a constant fresh water supply to the hens. Plans for the future involve getting an electricity supply to the outbuilding and the introduction of goats. Fundraising for this will continue next year.

The chickens are being looked after through the summer by 22 different families who have volunteered to come into school to take care of them and make sure they are all healthy and ready to continue to bring joy to our new Year 7 starters in September.

Finally, thank you very much to Scarterfields Animal Feeds who have provided all of our feed and bedding for the last year and a half and who will be continuing to sponsor us with this next school year. Louisa Fowles
