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## Your first day at Bishop Luffa

Your first full day at Bishop Luffa will be at the start of September. Unlike your transition day, you will need to be in school for 8:00 like everybody else – so it is a very early start! When you first arrive, you will be greeted by our Sixth Form students who will direct you to the Bartlett Hall where you will have breakfast with your Tutor Group, Form Tutor and your Head of House. There will also be some Year 8 students to help you who are House Buddies; they were in exactly the same situation as you only a year before! This will also be your first chance to see everyone in their brand-new school uniform.

For the rest of the day you will get the opportunity to work with your new Tutor Group, to meet everyone properly and to make new friends, and to develop study skills and teamwork. You will also be given your timetable and important information about how the school works. There is no need to worry about bringing a full bag of books and equipment on this day – just pens and pencils will be enough.

On your first day the school will seem very large and it may feel a little overwhelming, but as you grow more confident it will start to feel smaller and you will be able to find your way around more easily. For the first week or so you will be collected from your lessons by your subject teachers who will lead you to your classrooms. Once we think you're ready, you will then be able to find your own way around the school – but remember if you're feeling lost, you can always ask someone and they will point you in the right direction.

On the first day you will also have a chance to find out about the other things that go on at school in addition to lessons. This will include all the types of clubs and activities that you can join, opportunities to meet other people, sporting activities and extra trips that run throughout the school year – so make sure to get involved in as much as possible!

When you get home, your parents and carers will be keen to find out how you got on and will want to know every detail about your day. If you can, tell them what you have been doing – they are not 'being nosey', they are interested! Remember, starting secondary school is a big deal for them too!

# Equipment

You will be used to having lots of different bits of equipment to help at your primary school – and here at Luffa is no different. When you join, some important things you might need would include:

- A fairly large and sturdy waterproof bag
- A geometry set (compass, protractor, set square etc.)
- A scientific calculator
- A reading book
- A re-usable water bottle
- A pencil case containing:
  - o blue, black and green ballpoint pens
  - o A pencil, rubber and sharpener
  - o A ruler
  - A glue stick
  - Highlighters
  - Colouring pencils
  - Craft scissors

If you forget some of your equipment when you first start at Luffa, please don't worry – teachers are there to help you and we know there is a lot to remember.

For a good start to your school day, make sure you are organised the night before – don't pack your bag two seconds before you run off to catch the bus! Check your timetable and your planner to make sure you have all the right equipment for the lessons ahead. Your planner will also tell you if there are any special events happening in school, such as trips or non-uniform days.

It is also a good habit to make sure your items of uniform are ready for the next morning; make sure to ask your parents or carers for help with this too.

Most importantly, make sure you go to bed at a reasonable time and keep all electronic devices like mobile phones, iPads and games consoles outside of your bedroom so you're not distracted by them. The school day at Luffa starts early and the last thing you want is to be tired before you get there!



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# Daily Schedule

Something which may feel a bit daunting starting secondary school is having to get used to all of your new lessons and teachers. You will have five different lessons a day in five different classrooms with five different teachers — this will definitely be a big change from primary school. There will also be some subjects that you might have never studied before such as Textiles, Spanish or Product Design. There will also be some subjects you have studied before but you may not have studied in specialised classrooms, such as Science in laboratories, Technology in workshops or PE on the MUGA.

When you start at Luffa, your Form Tutor, teachers and Heads of House will help you find your way around so please don't worry if you're not too sure where you need to be. Remember you can always ask someone if you are unsure.

The timing of the school day will also be different from what you are used to at primary school. Every day at Bishop Luffa follows the timings below:




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# The planner

For some of you, homework will be a new experience – for others, it will already be a part of your school life. Some of your homework will be recorded online, but you may also find it useful to organise yourself with your planner which you will be given on your first day by your Form Tutor. You can see an example of what each page looks like below. Your Form Tutor should also ask your parents or carers to sign your planner every week so that they can check on your homework too, as well as pass on any messages.

The front half of your planner contains all of the school rules so that you can refer to them if you need to, particularly regarding homework, how to use the IT equipment, uniform and mobile phones. In the back of the planner there is lots of useful information including a map of the school, a periodic table, English connectives, a world map and well-being advice.





### What if?

You probably have hundreds of questions that you'd like answered; remember once you're here you can ask your Form Tutor, Head of House, teachers, or indeed other students if you're not sure about something. Some things you will also work out for yourself pretty quickly.

Below are some questions that previous Year 7 students said they were worried about before they started at Luffa – they may help you too.

#### What if I don't feel well?

Just like at your primary school, we have a Medical Room – your Form Tutor will show you where this is on your first day. If you have hurt yourself or are feeling unwell, ask your teacher's permission and you can go to see Mrs Langley, our School Nurse. If you are too unwell to stay in school, Mrs Langley will contact your parents or carers for you.

#### What if I lose my timetable and don't know where I'm meant to be?

Firstly, if you see someone from your class, ask them! If you are still unsure, head to Reception where the receptionist can print you a new timetable or point you in the right direction.

#### What if I forget to bring in some equipment?

If the equipment is important – such as PE kit or ingredients for Food Technology – go to Reception and ask for permission to phone your parents or carers so they can bring it in, if possible. If it is a smaller item – such as stationery – then you may be able to borrow an item from your Form Tutor or teacher. At the start of Year 7 your teachers do understand that you may sometimes forget things, but remember to pack your bag the night before and plan ahead.

#### What if I forget my lunch?

Just like if you forget some important equipment, go to Reception and ask to contact your parents or carers. Similarly, if you have run out of money on your account then talk to your Form Tutor or Head of House – they can allow the canteen to lend you money for the day if need-be, but just like forgetting your equipment you do want to make sure you're as organised and prepared for the day ahead as possible.



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#### What if I lose something?

Lost property is held in Reception. If you have lost something and it has not yet been handed in, then the Receptionist will make a note of what you have lost and make sure it is returned to you when it is handed in. Just like at primary school, make sure your name is on anything you bring in so that it can be easily returned. The school is a big place – sometimes things can be lost and may not be found for some time. With that in mind, do think twice about what you bring into school – especially expensive electrical equipment – and as to whether or not you really need it with you for the school day.

#### What if I have to leave school during the day?

If you need to leave school for something such as a medical appointment or music exam, your parents or carers need to contact your Form Tutor or Head of House to let them know when you will be leaving. When you leave school, you then need to sign out at Reception at the front of school. Similarly, if you come into school late because of an appointment, you also need to sign in at front reception and make sure your Form Tutor or Head of House know.

#### What if I miss registration?

Sometimes you may be late because of traffic or delays to your bus or train. In that case, much like if you are coming into school after an appointment, you must go to Reception and sign in.

#### What if I lose my locker key?

If you forget your key, then Reception can ask for one of the site team to open your locker. If you have lost your key completely, then your parents or carers can order a replacement key on Arbor.

#### What if I get my uniform dirty or wet on a rainy day?

Your Form Tutor or Head of House can write a note for your teachers in your planner explaining what has happened.

#### Remember if you aren't sure, just ask – there is always a solution!
