

Overview	We start Year 7 by reminding ourselves of some of the core concepts and skills covered in History. We also complete a baseline assessment at the start of the year. We look back briefly at the Romans, particularly in the local area, to help give a context for the later periods of British history that we study at KS3. Within Year 7, however, the main focus is on medieval Britain, from 1066 to the Wars of the Roses. There is also an investigation of Native American society and culture, and of pre-colonial African Kingdoms, broadening our area of study beyond Europe. Students undertake a range of assessments, including four standardised assessments (one of which is a 'baseline'), developing a variety of historical skills, such as use of key terms, understanding and use of second order concepts (e.g. cause and consequence), analysis and evaluation of source material, and coming to informed judgements. These skills will be vital in all years, and in Year 7 we really focus on ensuring core understanding of how to develop and apply them.
